### 5. Did this project change your thinking about neighbourhood hubs? If so, how?

### 7. Was the project website useful? If so, what was most useful?

#### 8. What would you like to see happen next?

- Moving into action the time spent building the foundation was well spent. A good investment.
- Action to get more paid staff & paid hours for hub work. Action to create tangible means to promote the value of hubs.
- Concrete steps: clarify hub structure, process per hints provided here. Hubs and mapping, should not define hubs by 'association name' but more a name given to a group of associations within a geographic area meeting for a common purpose (ie. North End Community Circle).
- Continue to build map & connect it with details about each Hub. A session on evaluation (for hubs to learn more about collecting and sharing their impacts).
- Actions, maybe small but some tangibles.
- Continue the journey; reach out to the 'absentee' partners
- Share knowledge with policy makers, politicians, public
- I would like to see an event that would showcase the work that has been done over the last 6 months
- Periodical updates and 'gathering together' times. Maybe visits to other hubs.
- Meet with other frontline staff to learn more about what they are doing on the ground; evaluations, volunteers, policy.
- It would be nice to meet a couple times a year.
- Expertise sharing.
- Concrete action steps that could lead to mutual support.
- Concrete action of some sort quarterly meeting would be great with a specific goal to accomplish in each.

- Continue meetings, quarterly?, continue mapping project, develop tool kit, develop branding
- Continued momentum
